Meet our new Chief Executive, Mark Powell



Mark Powell joined us on 3 April as our new Chief **Executive.** Prior to his appointment, Mark was **Managing Director and Deputy Chief Executive at** Leicestershire Partnership NHS Trust. Mark has over 20 years' experience of working in the NHS and spent several years as **Derbyshire Healthcare's Chief Operating Officer.** During that time at the **Trust, Mark campaigned** for new healthcare facilities to replace our current dormitory-style accommodation (now the **Making Room for Dignity** programme) and led the Trust's initial response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

We asked Mark about his appointment.

Why did you want this role?

Derbyshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust is an organisation that means a lot to me as I live in the area and have worked at the Trust before. It is a values-led Trust with a strong sense of team and a collaborative approach. There is lots of passion, energy and ideas amongst colleagues. It is also a really exciting time to be leading the Trust with new developments and opportunities on the horizon and a rich variety of services on offer. I want to ensure that we take all these positive elements and channel them to provide the best possible care for local people.

What will your approach be as the new Chief Executive?

I want to listen and learn and find out what has changed since I left in 2021 and what our current challenges are. I will be embracing the Trust's 'people first' value and ensuring that I am a visible leader, providing stability following a period of uncertainty and seeking to build an effective and cohesive executive team to take the Trust forward. \bigcirc

I will be looking forwards and ensuring that we continue to develop a working environment where colleagues feel able to take decisions to improve the services we provide. I will also be taking time to establish really clear and firm priorities for the years ahead, co-created with colleagues and stakeholders.

What is important to you in your role?

It is important to me that we work in partnership with our patient and carer groups, ensuring we collaborate to improve people's experiences. I will also be working closely with our stakeholders and partners to ensure our services provide the best care possible. I also feel it's vital to engage with colleagues in an effective and meaningful way.

I am keen to close the gaps that exist between different groups in our community in terms of health and wellbeing. It's easy to think that a phrase like 'health inequalities' is just jargon, but there is clear evidence that some groups of people are more likely to have shorter lives, and worse ill health, in part because they struggle to access health services. People with severe mental illness and people with a learning disability are just two of those groups. I feel it's our duty to do something about that.

As Chief Executive it is important for me, ultimately, that the Trust is the best it can be – as judged by our service users, carers, colleagues, partners and regulators. Mark Powell is a keen cyclist. In 2017 he cycled 150 miles coast to coast, from the Lake District to Whitby.

What are the key challenges you face?

There are a number of challenges that the Trust faces. I need to address the issues around recruitment and retention of staff; and the finances for 2023/24 as, post COVID, we are required to make greater savings than in previous years. There are also significant increases in demand for our services which we must address.

And finally, how do you feel about your appointment?

I'm really pleased and excited to be returning to Derbyshire Healthcare as Chief Executive. I feel closely aligned to the vision and values at the Trust, creating a 'people first' culture and involving people – our patients, colleagues, carers and partners – in our decision making.

It is an exciting time for the Trust as we develop new mental health facilities across the county, improving the privacy and dignity of people receiving inpatient care. The Trust is also improving many of our community services and expanding the service it offers with the introduction of a new Psychiatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) and I look forward to being part of these positive developments.

Selina Ullah, Trust Chair at Derbyshire Healthcare, said:

"I am thrilled to welcome Mark back to Derbyshire Healthcare. Mark has an excellent reputation for his leadership skills, and I am confident that he will be a great fit for our organisation, leading our Board of Directors and building on the Trust's successes to date."



The Trust's Medical Director kicked off NHS's national 75th birthday celebrations with speech to local school

To mark the 75th anniversary of NHS senior leaders across the country gave a series of talks in schools about what it's like to work in the NHS.

Making Room for Dignity: healthcare facilities update

In our last Connections magazine we updated you on the progress of our Making Room for Dignity programme – our exciting new-build and refurbishment plans, including our acute mental health inpatient units at Kingsway Hospital in Derby and the Chesterfield Royal Hospital site.

Since then, work has been progressing well and our new facilities are flying up!

Two ground-breaking ceremonies took place on 22 March 2023 for the two new 54-bed mental health units being built at the Kingsway Hospital in Derby and in the grounds of Chesterfield Royal Hospital.

The important milestone events were led by Trust Chair, Selina Ullah, and included a range of talks on project developments, insight from former service users on the importance of better patient experience and 'listen and learn' tours of the new site.



Therapy-based services

Therapy spaces, gardens with open spaces and sensory rooms are a great way of supporting service user recovery. The Making Room for Dignity programme team, working alongside staff, service users and carers, have worked hard to include as many of these spaces as possible in the new healthcare facilities. Nick Richards, the programme's lived patient experience lead, has worked with service users and carers from different backgrounds to understand more about their therapeutic and sensory requirements whilst staying on the wards.

Nick said: "Open areas with fresh air and natural sunlight are so important in aiding recovery. Our services users tell us that being able to leave the ward environment and go into a sensory space or garden and get fresh air is something that really enhances their wellbeing."



Making Room for Dignity: New unit names announced



In April we asked for suggestions from staff, service users and carers on what we should name our new and refurbished healthcare facilities.

There were some clear themes and preferences, with most suggestions received for the two new acute units being based on geographical areas within Derbyshire. In contrast, it was clear that people wanted a different type of name for the new Psychiatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) with many suggestions focused on types of birds, trees and flowers.

Colleagues, staff, and service users were also asked for views on whether to change or keep the names of the **Radbourne Unit** and **Audrey House** in Derby when they are refurbished for their new use. Most people voted for **both names to remain**, therefore there will be no changes to those unit names.

Many people also took the opportunity to suggest new names for our wards, as well as names for the units.

The voting was open to staff, service users, members, stakeholders and the public, and closed on Sunday 25 June.



Prestigious award for Nick Richards



Nick Richards. **Programme Support and Lived Patient Experience** colleague, has been actively involved in the **Trust's Making Room** for Dignity programme (see pages 5-6). On 25 May, Nick was awarded with a prestigious Health **Estates and Facilities Management Association** (HEFMA) award for his part in the Trust's programme to build new mental health facilities.

He was the winning finalist in the Personal Development category for his efforts to champion the views of patients and carers throughout the process of designing and building new mental health inpatient accommodation in Derby and Chesterfield.

The HEFMA awards recognise the hard work, excellence and achievements of NHS estates and facilities management staff across the UK. Nick, who has cerebral palsy, joined the Trust as an IT data analyst in 2016 but has excelled since joining the Making Room for Dignity programme team. As well as ensuring that the patient voice is heard, Nick has been involved in several design decisions; he helped to source a special type of anti-shock glass for cabinets, to be used in environments in which patients may become distressed, and he played a central part in designing magnetic panels to be used as locks on doors, which give privacy and dignity to patients but also allow easy access for clinical staff in an emergency.

Nick was overjoyed to win the award. He said: "The programme is very special to me. It has allowed me to use my experience to support those with mental illness or disability whose voices need to be heard, particularly on a project that will largely affect their experience."


Mark Powell, Chief Executive at Derbyshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust, praised Nick for his ongoing commitment. He said:

Leanne Walker: From patient to published author



Trust colleague Leanne shares impressive 'full circle' career since accessing mental health services as new thoughtprovoking book is launched

Leanne Walker, a lived experience worker at the Trust, has edited a book on children and young people's participation in shaping mental health services that is being published by the international firm Routledge.

Leanne, along with co-editor Hannah Sharp, has offered insights into how participation should be delivered in Participation in Children and Young People's Mental Health: An Essential Guide. The book offers valuable advice on how participation ought to work from academics but also from experts by experience. One young person at the book's launch event said, "I've never felt like professionals had listened to me before but, in the book, I have a voice and it has been personally impactful for my recovery."

Leanne first accessed Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) aged 15. "At 18, I started attending a participation group – a partnership between people working in, and young people accessing, the service with the goal of wanting to improve the service," said Leanne. It was this session which ignited my passion in the field."

Having overcome social anxiety, Leanne went on to take part in some fantastic projects including hosting a CAMHS event with Derby County stars Roy McFarland and Roger Davies to raise funds and awareness of World Mental Health Day; presenting at a national mental health conference in Manchester; and working with Great Involvement Future Thinking (GIFT), a partnership between young people and mental health professions formerly commissioned by NHS England, to advise on how to shape services on a national scale. Leanne was also invited to **Buckingham Palace in recognition** of their ongoing commitment and contributions to the sector.

With the publication of the new book, Leanne hopes to establish a single point of reference on involving young people in children's mental health services. "Before this book, I could only signpost people to a chapter or article on participation, never one central resource," said Leanne. "If it wasn't for the support of CAMHS, I would not be doing the job I am in now, nor would I be able to go about my daily life in the same way. I owe a lot to the people in these services for changing my life and opening so many doors for me."

Mark Powell, Chief Executive at Derbyshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust, said: "I've been blown away by the effort that has gone into producing this book.

"It is exciting that Leanne's hard work and dedication to this field of work is not going unnoticed. On behalf of Derbyshire Healthcare, I would like to thank Leanne for sharing experiences and knowledge that will help increase young people's participation in NHS services."

The Carers Trust's review commented on the clear thread of carer involvement, participation and co-production through the Triangle of Care standards that is embedded in activities across the Trust.

What is Triangle of Care?

The Triangle of Care membership scheme was developed by The Carers Trust and carers themselves. The 'Triangle of Care' is a working collaboration, or "therapeutic alliance" between the service user, professional and carer that promotes safety, supports recovery, and sustains well-being.

Mark Powell, Chief Executive at Derbyshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust, said: "It is fantastic to hear from the Carers Trust that we are providing care that promotes safety, supports recovery, and sustains wellbeing.

"Working to improve engagement between professionals and carers has been at the centre of a lot of our work and we will continue to look for new ways of improving those relationships, to benefit those in our care."

Best-selling author Adam Kay visits Trust to raise awareness around suicide in healthcare

In May, the Trust welcomed writer Adam Kay to Kingsway Hospital for a treeplanting ceremony to raise awareness around suicide in healthcare and remember those who have been lost to suicide.

Trust Chief Executive Mark Powell and Medical Director Dr Arun Chidambaram joined Adam – a former NHS doctor and the writer of This is Going to Hurt, recently adapted and broadcast as a BBC TV series – to plant the tree in the hospital's memorial garden. The event was organised by the charity Doctors in Distress, which seeks to highlight the importance of providing mental health support to healthcare workers.

Suicide rates in the healthcare sector are higher than the general population as a result of burnout, anxiety and depression. Doctors in Distress aims to plant a tree in all hospitals across the UK to remember healthcare workers and help prevent suicide. Derbyshire Healthcare was the first site to have a tree planted.

Adam Kay said: "The TV series of This is Going to Hurt culminated in the death by suicide of a doctor called Shruti – a fictional character based on so many tragic stories. In the show, a tree was planted in her memory, which has led to trees being planted in real-life hospitals to commemorate lost colleagues. I'm very proud to support Doctors in Distress in raising awareness of this vital issue."

Dr Arun Chidambaram said: "As a provider of mental health services, we are committed to supporting Trust colleagues with all aspects of their wellbeing as we know that our work is challenging and the pressures can be significant. That is particularly true when there are safety incidents involving patients; we have been an early adopter of a new national incident response framework to help develop a just culture and ensure that the

focus of any investigation is on improving the way we operate as an organisation, not on apportioning blame to individuals.

"As Medical Director, I'm committed to the wellbeing of our medical workforce and I believe that initiatives like our 'buddy scheme' for junior doctors and our Medical Senate – a forum for all doctors – will improve morale and wellbeing."

New services are being developed to help Derbyshire residents who are in crisis. Three out-of-hours mental health drop-in services will launch later this year in Buxton, Ripley and Swadlincote, and a safe haven will open in Chesterfield to complement the current safe haven in Derby.

Just the job: Trust's employment service gets national thumbs-up

The Work Your Way team – a group of employment specialists, job coaches and peer support workers who provide support to people using community mental health services in Derbyshire, helping them to find work and stay in work – were praised in the review for their positive team culture, good communication and focus on continuous learning and collaboration.

Samantha Parr, team manager, said: "I am delighted that the team have been recognised for all their efforts. This award is also for the clinical teams that we work with and for the service users we have supported.
