Latest developments

A new pharmacy site is set to open this week in the Derbyshire Dales, offering more choice to those booking their vaccination appointments. This is the seventh pharmacy-led site to have opened in Derbyshire.

We now have videos walking people through the vaccination process from receiving their invitation to book all the way to leaving after having their jab. 






The latest NHS England statistics show the Joined Up Care Derbyshire continues to perform well compared with other systems across the Midlands the rest of England.




Despite continuing challenges around vaccine supply, the vaccination teams have now vaccinated more than 40% of the population aged over 16.



Zooming in on a group of people who have recently begun receiving their vaccine, more than 87% of people aged 65-69 have now been vaccinated, again putting Derbyshire in the top half of the country.



More than three million doses have been administered across the Midlands, including more than 350,000 in Derbyshire, which ranks the county third in the region.



FAQs

Who is defined as 'clinically vulnerable'?

People with the following conditions are automatically deemed clinically extremely vulnerable:

- solid organ transplant recipients
- people with specific cancers

- people with severe respiratory conditions including all cystic fibrosis, severe asthma and severe chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)
- people with rare diseases that significantly increase the risk of infections (such as severe combined immunodeficiency (SCID), homozygous sickle cell disease)
- people on immunosuppression therapies sufficient to significantly increase risk of infection
- problems with your spleen, for example splenectomy (having your spleen removed)
- adults with Down's syndrome
- adults on dialysis or with chronic kidney disease (stage 5)
- pregnant women with significant heart disease, congenital or acquired
- other people who have also been classed as clinically extremely vulnerable, based on clinical judgement and an assessment of their needs. GPs and hospital clinicians have been provided with guidance to support these decisions

Letters have now been sent to patients aged 56-59 and they should be receiving them over the coming days. They will be able to book their first vaccine using the national booking service once they receive their letter.
