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- 1 January NEW YEAR'S DAY first day of the year in the Gregorian calendar.
- 5 January GOBIND SINGH JI'S BIRTHDAY Sikh Guru Gobind Singh was the 10th Sikh guru of Nanak and founder of the Khalsa.
- 6 January CHRISTMAS Armenian Orthodox Christian Armenian Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus on Epiphany, except for Armenians living in Israel, who celebrate Christmas on January 19th.
- 6 January EPIPHANY Christian Known as Theophany in Eastern Christianity, it celebrates the manifestation of Jesus as Christ.
- 7 January CHRISTMAS Eastern Christian Most Orthodox churches celebrate Christmas 13 days later than other Christian churches based on their use of the Julian rather than the Gregorian version of the Western calendar.
- 14 January MAKAR SANKRANTI Hindu Seasonal celebration marking turning of the sun toward the north.
- 17 January WORLD RELIGION DAY Bahá'í Observance to proclaim the oneness of religion.
- 27 January UN HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY Annual International Day of Commemoration in memory of the victims of the Holocaust coinciding with the anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz death camp in 1945.
- 28 January MAHAYANA NEW YEAR Buddhist In Mahayana countries the New Year starts on the first full moon day in January.
- 28 January TU B'SHVAT Jewish New Year's Day for Trees, and traditionally the first of the year for tithing fruit of trees. Now a day for environmental awareness and action, such as tree planting.



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- 2 February CANDLEMAS Christian presentation of Christ in the temple.
- 2 February IMBOLIC CANDLEMAS Pagan.
- 2 February ST BRIGHID OF KILDARE Christian.
- 3 February SETSEBUN Shinto beginning of spring.
- 3 February ST BLAZE DAY Christian.
- 5 February VASANT PANCHAMI Hlindu to mark the beginning of spring.
- 12 February LUNAR NEW YEAR Confucian Daoist and Buddhist Also known as the Spring Festival, an important festival celebrated at the turn of the traditional lunisolar Chinese calendar.
- 14 February VALENTINE'S DAY Celebrates the idea of romantic love.
- 15 February NIRVANA DAY Buddhist Celebrates the day when the historical Buddha achieved Parinirvana, or complete Nirvana, upon the death of his physical body.
- 20 February WORLD DAY OF SOCIAL JUSTICE U.N. day to recognise efforts to achieve fair outcomes for all through employment, social protection, social dialogue, and fundamental principles and rights at work.
- 25-28 February AYYÁM-I-HA OR INTERCALARY DAYS Bahá'í The Ayyám-i-ha, or "Days of Ha" are devoted to spiritual preparation for the fast, celebrating, hospitality, charity and gift giving.
- 26 February PURIM Jewish The "Feast of Lots" marks the salvation of the Jews of ancient Persia from extermination.
- 27 February MEAT FARE Orthodox Christian.
- 27 February TRANSFIGURATION SUNDAY Christian.



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- 1-19 March NINETEEN-DAY FAST Bahá'í Baha'is between 15 and 70 years of age do not eat or drink from sunrise to sunset and set aside time for prayer and meditation.
- 1 March• SHROVE TUESDAY Western Christian A day of penitence as well as the last chance to feast before Lent begins. Also known as Mardi Gras, Fat Tuesday and Carnival Day as this day is observed in many ways worldwide.
- 2 March ASH WEDNESDAY Western Christian The first day of Lent for Western Christian churches, a 40-day period of spiritual preparation for Easter, not counting Sundays.
- 8 March INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY Celebration of women worldwide.
- 11 March MUSLIM Laylat al Miraj Commemorates the Prophet Muhammad's nighttime journey from Mecca to the 'Farthest Mosque' in Jerusalem where he ascended to heaven, was purified, and given the instruction for Muslims to pray five times daily.
- 11 March MAHA SHIVARATRI Hindu the Great Night of Shiva, is a festival in reverence of the god Shiva.
- 17 March ST. PATRICK'S DAY Christian Feast day of the patron saint of Ireland.
- 20 March VERNAL EQUINOX Marks the first day of the season of spring.
- 28 March KHORDAD SAL Zoroastrian The Zoroastrian celebration of the birth of Zoroaster, the founder of the Zoroastrianism religion.
- 28 March MAGHA PUJA Buddhist Also known as Sangha Day, it commemorates the spontaneous assembly of 1,250 disciples, completely enlightened monks, in the historical Buddha's presence.
- 28 March PALM SUNDAY Christian Observed the Sunday before Easter/Pascha to commemorate the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem.
- 28 March to 4 April PASSOVER/PESACH Jewish The eight-day "Feast of Unleavened Bread" celebrates Israel's deliverance from Egyptian bondage.
- 29 March HOLA MOHALLA Sikh An annual event which is a martial arts parade historically coinciding with Holi, the Hindu festival of colours.
- 29 March HOLI Hindu A spring festival in India and Nepal dedicated to the god of pleasure, also known as the festival of colours or the festival of sharing love.
- 29 March MAWLID Islam Birth of Imam Mahdi believed by Twelver Shī'a Muslims to be the Mahdī, an ultimate saviour of humankind and the final Imām.



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- 2 April HUNDU Hindi New Year. Ramayana begins.
- 3 April ISLAM Ramadan begins. Observed by Muslims worldwide as a month of fasting to commemorate the first revelation of the Qur'an to the Prophet Muhammad8 April YOM
- 10 April RAMANAVAMI Hindu Celebrates the birthday of Rama, king of ancient India, hero of the epic Ramayana, and seventh incarnation of Vishnu.
- 10 April CHRISTIAN Palm Sunday.
- 14 April VAISAKHI (Baisakhi) Sikh The festival which celebrates the founding of the Sikh community as the Khalsa (community of the initiated).
- 15 April GOOD FRIDAY Christian Known as Holy Friday in Eastern Christianity, it commemorates the Crucifixion of Jesus on the Friday before Easter/Pascha.
- 16 April THERAVADA NEW YEAR Buddhist In Theravada countries the New Year is celebrated on the first full moon day in April.
- 17 April EASTER Christian Known as Pascha in Eastern Christianity, it celebrates the resurrection of Jesus.
- 21 April to 20-May 1 FESTIVAL OF RIDVÁN Bahá'í Annual festival commemorating the 12 days when Bahá'u'lláh, the prophet-founder of the Bahá'í Faith, resided in a garden called Ridván (Paradise) and publicly proclaimed his mission as God's messenger for this age.
- 28 April YOM HA SHOAH Judaism- Holocaust remembrance day.
- 29 April LAILA AL-QADR Islamic Commemorates the night that the Qur'an was first revealed to the Prophet Muhammad. It is known as the "Night of Power."
- 30 April LAG B'OMER Judaism Celebrates the end of a divine-sent plague and/or Roman occupation during Rabbi Akiva's lifetime (died c. 135 CE).



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- 1 May INTERNATIONAL WORKER'S DAY Also known as May Day, it celebrates the social and economic achievements of workers worldwide.
- 1 May WICCA/NEO PAGIA Beltane May Day Festival.
- 2 May TWELTH DAY OF RIVAN Baha'i.
- 2 May RAMADAN FINISHES Islam.
- 3 May EID AL-FITR Islamic The "Feast of the Breaking of the Fast" marks the end of Ramadan, the holy month of fasting from dawn until dusk.
- 3 May •ST PHILIPS AND ST JAMES DAY Christian.
- 4 May Multi Faith International day of prayer.
- 5 May YOM HA'ATZMAUT Judaism Independence Day celebration.
- 8 May MOTHER'S DAY Children show appreciation for their mothers and mother figures.
- 19 May LAG B'OMAR Judaism celebrates the death and life of Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai who was a Mishnaic sage back in the 2nd century.
- 27 May VISAKHA PUJA Buddhist Also known as Vesak or Buddha Day, it marks the birth, spiritual awakening and death (nirvana) of the historical Buddha. (This date may vary based on region or sect.)
- 29 May ASCENSION OF BAHÁ'U'LLÁH Bahá'í Observance of the anniversary of the death in exile of Bahá'u'lláh, the prophet-founder of the Bahá'í Faith.



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Full Month • LGBTQ+ • Pride month.

- 2 June ASCENSION DAY Christian Also known as Holy Thursday, celebrated 40 days after Easter/Pascha, it commemorates the ascension of Jesus into Heaven.
- 5-6 June SHAVUOT Jewish The "Feast of Weeks" celebrates the covenant established at Sinai between God and Israel, and the revelation of the Ten Commandments.
- 5 June PENTECOST Christian Also known as Whitsunday, the seventh Sunday after Easter/Pascha commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and women followers of Jesus. Marks the birth of the Christian Church.
- 12 June ANNE FRANK DAY Birthday of young Jewish girl whose diary describes her family's experiences hiding from the Nazis through assistance of Gentile friends.
- 12 June TRINITY SUNDAY Christian.
- 13 June RACE UNITY DAY Bahá'í Observance promoting racial harmony and understanding and the essential unity of humanity.
- 19 June JUNETEENTH Originally commemorating the announcement of the abolition of slavery in Texas in 1865, it is now celebrated throughout the U.S. to honor African-American freedom and achievement.
- 20 June FATHER'S DAY Children show appreciation for their fathers and father figures.
- 20 June SUMMER SOLSTICE Marks the first day of the season of summer. The length of time between sunrise and sunset is the longest of the year with the sun shining the farthest from the Southern Hemisphere and the closest to the Northern Hemisphere.
- 20 June WORLD REFUGEE DAY Raises awareness about the plight of refugees and displaced persons.
- 21 June SUMMER SOLSTICE



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10 July • MARTYRDOM OF THE BÁB • Bahá'í - Observance of the anniversary of the execution by a firing squad in Tabríz, Persia, of the 30-year-old Siyyid 'Alí-Muhammad, the Báb, the prophet-herald of the Bahá'í Faith.

11 July • ST BENEDICT DAY - Catholic.

13-15 July • ULLAMBANA (Obon) • Buddhist - Ullambana, a Sanskrit term that means "hanging upside down and suffering," honours the spirits of past ancestors and strives to relieve aching souls from suffering.

13 July • ASALHA PUJA DAY - Buddhism. honours the Buddha's first sermon in the Deer Park in Benares, India, and the foundation of the Buddhist Sangha. In Thailand,

15 July • ST VLADIMIR THE GREAT DAY - Orthodox Christian.

20 July • EID AL-ADHA • Islamic - Commemoration of Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son in obedience of a command from God. Marks the end of the annual Hajj (pilgrimage to Mecca).

23 July • EMPEROR HAILE SELASSIE BIRTHDAY - Rastafarian.

24 July • DHARMA DAY • Buddhist - Also known as Asalha Puja, it commemorates the historical Buddha's first discourse following his spiritual awakening.

25 July • JAMES THE GREAT DAY - Christian.

29 July • MUHARRAM • Islamic - The month of Muharram marks the beginning of the Islamic liturgical year. This first day, al-Hijra, remembers the migration of Muhammad and his followers from Mecca to Medina in 622 CE.







- 7 August TISHA B'AV Jewish Mourning of the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem in 586 BCE and 70 CE.
- 7 August ASHURA Islamic A day of fasting observed on the 10th day of the month of Muharram to celebrate Moses' exodus from Egypt. For Shi'a Muslims, it also marks the climax of the ten-day Remembrance of Muharram, which mourns the martyrdom of Hussein at the Battle of Kerbala.
- 9 August INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE WORLD'S INDIGENOUS PEOPLES Recognises the challenges indigenous peoples face today, ranging from poverty and disease to dispossession, discrimination, religious persecution and denial of basic human rights.
- 11 August RAKSHA BANDHAN Hindu Also called Rakhi, this festival celebrates the protective relationship between brothers and their sisters.
- 12 August INTERNATIONAL YOUTH DAY Celebrates young people and the integral role they play in helping to create a world fit for children.
- 18 August KRISHNA JANMASHTAMI Hindu festival celebrating the birth of Krishna, an avatar of the god Vishnu.
- 23 August INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE REMEMBRANCE OF THE SLAVE TRADE AND ITS ABOLITION Memorializes the tragedy of the transatlantic slave trade, coinciding with the anniversary of the uprising in Santo Domingo (today Haiti and the Dominican Republic) that initiated its abolition.
- 30 August GANESH CHATURTHI Hindu Celebrates the birthday of Ganesha, the elephant-deity.
- 31 August KRISHNA JANMASHTAMI Hindu Celebrates Krishna's birthday, Vishnu's eighth incarnation on earth.



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- 1 September RELIGIOUS YEAR STARTS Orthodox Christian.
- 8 September NATIVITY OF THE VIRGIN MARY Christian.
- 11 September ETHIOPIAN NEW YEAR Rastafarian.
- 14 September ELEVATION OF THE CROSS Christian.
- 22 SeptemberAUTUMNAL EQUINOX Marks the first day of the season of autumn. The sun shines nearly equally on both hemispheres when its fall in the Northern Hemisphere and simultaneously spring in the Southern Hemisphere.
- 23 September AUTUMN EQUINOX Wicca/Neo Pagan.
- 25 September ROSH HASHANAH Jewish Beginning of the Jewish New Year and first of the High Holy Days, which marks the beginning of a ten-day period of penitence and spiritual renewal.
- 26 September NAVARATRI COMMENCES Hindu the name translates as 'nine nights' and is a celebration that honours the Mother Goddess Durga.
- 29 September MICHEAL OF ALL ANGELS Christian.







- 4 October ST FRANCIS DAY Catholic Christian.
- 5 October YOM KIPPUR Jewish The "Day of Atonement" marks the end of the Ten Days of Penitence that begin with Rosh Hashanah.
- 8 October MAWLID AL-NABI (MILAD AL-NABI) Islamic (Sunni) The observance of the birthday of Islam founder Prophet Muhammad, which is celebrated in Rabi' al-awwal, the third month in the Islamic calendar. Shi'a Muslims celebrate it five days later than Sunni Muslims.
- 10 October SUKKOT Jewish The week-long "Feast of Booths" commemorates the 40-year wandering of the Israelites in the desert on the way to the Promised Land.
- 15 October DUSSEHRA/DASSERA Hindu Anniversary of the day when Rama killed the evil demon Ravana. Also known as Durga Puja, which celebrates the goddess Durga.
- 17 October SHEMINI ATZERET Jewish "The Eighth (Day) of Assembly" is observed on the day immediately following Sukkot.
- 17 October INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ERADICATION OF POVERTY Call to action for the eradication of poverty and destitution worldwide.
- 24 October UNITED NATIONS DAY Commemorates the founding of the world organisation in 1945.
- 24 October DIWALI Hindu Also called Deepavali, "Festival of Lights", it celebrates the victory of good over evil, light over darkness, and knowledge over ignorance.
- 25 October VIKRAM Hindu New Year festival.
- 27 October BIRTH OF BAHA'U'LLAH Baha'i.
- 31 October HALLOWEEN The eve of All Saints' Day.
- 31 October REFORMATION DAY Christian Commemorates the beginning of the Protestant Reformation in 1517.



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- 1 November ALL SAINTS' DAY Western Christian Commemorates all known and unknown Christian saints. Eastern Christianity observes it on the first Sunday after Pentecost.
- 2 November ALL SOULS' DAY Christian Commemoration of all faithful Christians who are now dead.
- 3 November GUR-GADDI GURU GRANTH SAHIB Sikh Since 1708, Sikhs have accepted Sri Guru Granth Sahib as their eternal Guru that holds the spirit of all Ten Gurus of the Sikhs.
- 4 November BANDI-CHHOR DIWAS Sikh A commemorative occasion having no fixed date which occurs in October or November and celebrates the release of the Sixth Guru Har Gobind Sahib from imprisonment and coincides with Diwali, the Hindu festival of lights.
- 7 November BIRTH OF BAHÁ'U'LLÁH Bahá'í Anniversary of the birth in 1817 of Bahá'u'lláh, prophet-founder of the Bahá'í Faith, in Núr, Persia.
- 19 November GURU NANAK DEV JI'S BIRTHDAY Sikh A very important holiday in the Sikh faith as Guru Nanak Dev's was the First Guru of the Sikhs and the Founder of Sikhism.
- 25 November DAY OF THE COVENANT Bahá'í Day of the Covenant is a festival observed to commemorate Bahá'u'lláh's appointment of His son, Abdu'l-Baha, as His successor.
- 28 November to 24 December ADVENT Christian Advent is a season of spiritual preparation in observance of the birth of Jesus. In Western Christianity, it starts on the fourth Sunday before Christmas. In Eastern Christianity, the season is longer and begins in the middle of November.
- 29 November to 6 December CHANUKAH Jewish Eight-day "Festival of Lights", also known as Hanukkah, celebrating the rededication of the Temple to the service of God in 164 BCE.



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- 8 December BODHI DAY Buddhist Also known as Rohatsu, commemorates the day that the Buddha, Siddharta Gautama, experienced enlightenment or spiritual awakening (bodhi). Celebrated on the eighth day either of December or the 12th month of the lunar calendar.
- 12 December OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE Christian- Celebrates the apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary (by her title, Our Lady of Guadalupe, the Patroness of Mexico and the Americas) before Juan Diego, an indigenous convert to Roman Catholicism, on the Mexican hill of Tepeyac in 1531.
- 18 December HANUKKAH COMMENCES Judaism Hanukkah is an eight-day Jewish festival with the first day known as Chanukah, Festival of Lights.
- December WINTER SOLSTICE Marks the first day of the season of winter. The length of time between sunrise and sunset is the shortest of the year with the sun shining closest to the Southern Hemisphere and the farthest from the Northern Hemisphere.
- 24 December CHRISTMAS EVE Christian Celebration of the arrival of Mary and Joseph in Bethlehem for the birth of Jesus.
- 25 December CHRISTMAS Western Christian Commemorates the birth of Jesus.
- 26 December to 1 January KWANZAA A seven-day celebration honoring African American heritage and its continued vitality. "Kwanzaa" means "first fruits (of the harvest)" in Swahili.
- 31 December NEW YEAR'S EVE In the Gregorian calendar, New Year's Eve, the last day of the year.
