JANUARY

*1 January • NEW YEAR'S DAY • first day of the year in the Gregorian calendar.

*5 January • GOBIND SINGH JITS BIRTHDAY • Sidn - Guru Gobind Singh was the 10th guru of Nanak and founder of the Khalsa.

*6 January • CHRISTMAS • Armenian Orthodox Christian Armenian Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus on Epiphany, except for Armenians living in Israel, who celebrate Christmas on January 19th.

*6 January • EPIPHANY • Christian - Known as Theophany in Eastern Christian remaindestation of Jesus as Christ.

*7 January • CHRISTMAS • Eastern Christian - Most Orthodox churches celebrate Christmas 13 days later than other Christian churches based on their use of the Julian rather than the Gregorian version of the Western calendar.

18 May • ASCENSION DAY • Christian - Also known as Holy Thursday, celel Easter/Pascha, it commemorates the ascension of Jesus into Heaven.

25-27 May • SHAVUOT • Jewish - The "Feast of Weeks" celebrates the cover Sinal between God and Israel, and the revelation of the Ten Commandments

28 May • PENTECOST • Christian - Also known as Whitsunday, the seventh Sunday after Easter/Pascha commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and women followers of Jesus, Marks the britind the Christian Church.

*29 May • ASCENSION OF BAHÁ'U'LLÁH • Bahá'í - Observance of the a in exile of Bahá'u'lláh, the prophet-founder of the Bahá'í Faith.



SEPTEMBER

15 September • ROSH HASHANAH • Jewish - Beginning of the Jewish New Year and first of the High Holy Days, which marks the beginning of a ten-day period of penitence and spiritual

22. September AUTUMNAL EQUINOX • Marks the first day of the season of autumn. The sun hines nearly equally on both hemispheres when its fall in the Northern Hemisphere and imultaneously spring in the Spullbare Magningham

27 September • MAWLID Al-NABI (MILAD Al-NABI) • Islamic (Sunni) - The observance of the birthday of Islam founder Prophet Muhammad, which is celebrated in Rabi' al-awwel, the third month in the Islamic calendar. Shi'a Muslims celebrate it five days later than Sunni Muslims.

29 September • SUKKOT • Jewish - The week-long "Feast of Booths" commer year wandering of the Israelites in the desert on the way to the Promised Land.

*15 February • NIRVANA DAY • Buddhist · Celebrates the day when the historical Buddha achieved Parinirvana, or complete Nirvana, upon the death of his physical body.

rebruary • WORLD DAY OF SOCIAL JUSTICE U.N. • day to recognise efforts to achieve fair mes for all through employment, social protection, social dialogue, and fundamental pics and rights at work.

21 February * SHROVE TUESDAY * Western Christian - A day of penitence as well as the last chance to feast before Lent begins. Also known as Mardi Gras, Fat Tuesday and Camival Day as this day is observed in many ways worldwide.

22 February • ASH WEDNESDAY • Western Christian - The first day of Lent for Western Christian churches, a 40-day period of spiritual preparation for Easter, not counting Sundays.



JUNE

11 June • RACE UNITY DAY • Bahá'í - Observance promoting radial has understanding and the essential unity of humanity.

*12 June • ANNE FRANK DAY • Birthday of young Jewish girl whose diany describes her family's experiences hiding from the Nazis through assistance of Gentile friends.

*19 June • JUNETEENTH • Originally commemorating the announcement of the abolition slavery in Texas in 1865, it is now celebrated throughout the U.S. to honor African-Ameri freedom and white-speed.

28 June • EID AL-ADHA • Islamic - Commemoration of Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son in obedience of a command from God. Marks the end of the annual Hajj (pilgrimage to Mecca).

6 October • SHEMINI ATZERET • Jewish - "The Eighth (Day) of Asse day immediately following Sukkot.

15 October • NAVARATRI COMMENCES - Hindu - the name tran celebration that honours the Mother Goddess Durga.

*17 October • INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ERADICATION OF POWERTY • Call to at the eradication of poverty and destitution worldwide.

23 October • DUSSEHRA/DASSERA • Hindu - Anniversary of the day when Rama killed the evil demon Ravana. Also known as Durga Puja, which celebrates the goddess Durga.

*31 October • REFORMATION DAY • Christian - Co Protestant Reformation in 1517

*1-19 March • NINETEEN-DAY FAST • Bahá'í - Baha'is between 15 and 70 years of age do not eat or drink from surrise to sunset and set aside time for prayer and meditation.

6 March + PURIM • Jewish The "Feast of Lots" marks the salvation of the Jews of ancient Persia from extermination. 6 March • HOLI • Hindu - A spring festival in India and Nepal dedicated to the god of pleasure, also known as the festival of colours or the festival of sharing love.

6 March • MAGHA PUJA • Buddhist - Also known as Sangha Day, it commemorates the spontaneous assembly of 1,250 disciples, completely enlightened monks, in the historical

11 March • HOLA MOHALLA • Sikh - An annual event which is a martial arts par historically coinciding with Holi, the Hindu festival of colours.

*20 March • VERNAL EQUINOX • Marks the first day of the season of spi 22 March • HUNDU • Hindi New Year. Ramayana begins.

3 July • DHARMA DAY • Buddhist · Also known as Asalha Puja, it comm Buddha's first discourse following his spiritual awakening.

*9 July • MARTYRDOM OF THE BÁS • Bahá'i • Observance of the anniversary of the execution by a firing squad in Tabriz, Persia, of the 30-year-old Sayyid 'Ali-Muhammad, the Báb, the prophet-heraid of the Bahá'i Fath.

*11 July • ST BENEDICT DAY - Catholic.

18 July • MUHARRAM • Islamic - The month of Muharram marks the beginning of the Islamic liburgical year. This first day, al-Hijra, remembers the migration of Muhammad and his followers from Mecca to Medina in 622 CE.

*23 July • EMPEROR HAILE SELASSIE BIRTHDAY - Rastafarian

*25 July • JAMES THE GREAT DAY - Christian.

26 July • TISHA B'AV • Jewish - Mourning of the destr Jerusalem in S86 BCE and 70 CE.

28 July • ASHURA • Islamic - A day of fasting observed on the 10th day of the month of Muharram to celebrate Moses' exodus from Egypt. For Shi'a Muslims, it also marks the climax of the ten-day Remembrance of Muharram, which mourns the martyridom of Hussein at the

*1 November • ALL SAINTS' DAY • Western Christian • Commemorates all known and uni Christian saints. Eastern Christianity observes it on the first Sunday after Pentecost.

*3 November • GUR-GADDI GURU GRANTH SAHIB • Sikh - Since 1708, Sikhs have accepted Si Guru Granth Sahib as their eternal Guru that holds the spirit of all Ten Gurus of the Sikhs.


*7 November • BERTH OF BAHÁU'LLÁH • Bahá'í Anniversary of the birth in 1817 of Bahá'u'llá prophet-founder of the Bahá'í Faith, in Núr, Persia.

12 November • DIWALI • Hindu - Also called Deepavali, "Festival of Lights", it celebrates the victory of good over evil, light over darkness, and knowledge over ignorance.

*19 November • GURU NANAK DEV 31'S BIRTHDAY • Sikh - A very important holiday in Sikh faith as Guru Nanak Dev's was the First Guru of the Sikhs and the Founder of Sikhism. *25 November • DAY OF THE COVENANT • Bahá'í - Day of the Covenant is a festival to commemorate Bahá'u'liáh's appointment of His son, Abdu'l-Baha, as His successor.

2 April • PALM SUNDAY • Christian • Observed the Sunday before commemorate the entry of Jesus Into Jerusalem. *5 April • PASSOVER/PESACH • Jewish - The eight-day "Feast of Unio Israel's deliverance from Equation bondage.

6 April • THERAWADA NEW YEAR • Buddhist - In Therawada countries the New Year is celebrated on the first full moon day in April.

7 April • GOOD FRIDAY • Christian • Known as Holy Friday in Eastern Christicommemorates the Crucifixion of Jesus on the Friday before Easter/Pascha.

*14 April • WAISAKHI (Baisakhi) • Sikh - The festival which celebrates the four community as the Khalsa (community of the initiated).

18 April • LAILA AL-QADR • Islamic • Commemorates the night that the Qur'an was first revealed to the Prophet Muhammad. It is known as the "Night of Power"

21 April • EID AL-FITR • Islamic - The "Feast of the Breaking of the Fast" marks the end of Ramadan, the holy month of fasting from dawn until dusk.

1 August ULLAMBANA (Obon) * Buddhist - Ullambana, a Sanskrit term that means "hanging upside down and suffering," honours the spirits of past ancestors and strives to relieve aching

*9 August • INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE WORLD'S INDIGENOUS PEOPLES • Recognises the challenges indigenous peoples face today; ranging from poverty and disease to dispossession, discrimination, religious persecution and denial of basic human rights.

*12 August • INTERNATIONAL YOUTH DAY • Celebrates young people and the integral role they play in helping to create a world fit for children. *23 August • INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE REMEMBRANCE OF THE SLAVE TRADE AND IT!

ABOLITION • Memorializes the tragedy of the transatlantic slave trade, coinciding with the anniversary of the uprising in Santo Domingo (today Halti and the Dominican Republic) that
